FROM THE RABBI: VIGNETTES OF RAMAT GAN

Leo and I are staying in an apartment we rented through AirB&B in Ramat Gan, Israel, while we visit our son and daughter-in-law, Jake and Michal, and their five children. Ramat Gan is a sizable city of over 145,000 inhabitants, and this particular neighborhood is mixed in several regards. New high rises with large apartments have been built among older buildings with cramped apartments or oddly affixed additions, leading to a mixture of well-off residents and those barely getting by. The Yemenite, Moroccan, and Ashkenazi Orthodox in the neighborhood co-exist with chiloni/secular residents in decidedly less modest dress. This is the first time we've rented an apartment in one of those new high rises instead of an older building. The view from our third-story apartment includes the Bnei Brak cemetery, where a large group of black-hat/black-coat adorned men were wailing at a grave this afternoon.

This morning, Leo went on a fieldtrip with Chananya's $(6\frac{1}{2})$ class, and I left the apartment and headed down the hill through the park. Being a weekday, the park was inhabited by babies in strollers pushed by parents, grandparents or nannies; retirees and second-shift workers using the equipment in the exercise area, including a frail woman walking the perimeter supported by the surrounding rail, with her health aide close beside her; and wheelchair-bound elderly men and women pushed by health aides or relatives.

This is not a tourist area, so the shopkeepers do not speak much English. Yesterday, I attempted to buy measuring cups at a small shop in the mall, but I didn't know the term in Hebrew, and the shopkeeper didn't understand the English term. She went across to the coffee bar and asked if anyone spoke English. The manager came over; and when he did not know the term "measuring cup," whipped out his phone and had me key it into his translation app. Voila: "cos m'dida"! It didn't help in the short run as she didn't have any.

But today I headed over to the hardware store, and when they asked if they could help me find something, I asked for "cos m'dida" and swiftly completed my purchase. Emboldened, I went searching for a belt (chagorah) in several stores until I found what I was looking for.

After a late breakfast in an outdoor café, I headed back through the park. This time I noticed four people in wheelchairs lined up across from each other. Making up the bottom of the U-shaped configuration were three young men on a bench in earnest conversation, whom I presumed to be their caretakers. Elsewhere in the park I came upon three women on a bench conversing in Russian, their three wheelchair-bound clients lined up facing them.

As I headed over to pick up Amiel (almost 4) from pre-school at 2 p.m., children were everywhere heading home from school, some accompanied by a parent or a grandparent, some on bikes, and some in chatty groups. I introduced myself as "savta shel Amiel" (Amiel's grandmother), and they half asked/half commented that I am with the saba (grandfather) who picked him up yesterday. Later, coming back from the super-kosher grocery store (where everything is glatt kosher and the Purim chocolates are all on sale before the chametz is cleared out for Pesach), Amiel was on his scooter while I pushed Noam (14 months) in the stroller and Binyamin (11) lagged behind reading a religious comic book he asked me for in the grocery store.

Amiel rode ahead and stopped at the curb. Suddenly a man darted out of the shwarma place at the corner to where Amiel had halted at the curb and looked one way down the street, turned the other way and saw me, and was visibly relieved ("Ah, at ito"/you are with him) that this wasn't an unattended child about to get hit by a car. This is something I have noticed here before-everyone pays attention to the children!

Tomorrow being Friday, the children have a half-day of school, and then it will get very quiet in the evening while everyone is home for Shabbat dinner, very few cars in the street. Later that night, the chilonim/secular residents will go out dancing.
