From the President

To the members of Congregation Beth Shalom come these greetings from your president:

I write in the fervent hope that this missive finds you in good health and spirits, enjoying the warmth of the season. Now we are gripped in the height of summer, but soon fall will be here and our thoughts must turn to welcoming the New Year. I invite all in our congregation and our wide community to come join with us in starting off our year on Sunday, August 25, at our annual congregation picnic/barbecue, in Welsh Park at 12 noon. This will as usual be a meat meal so please bring a non-dairy dish to share! Full details are elsewhere in this issue of *haShofar*.

At our picnic, we will be seeking those who can volunteer their time and effort to help our congregation by hosting Shabbat potlucks and onegs. To host a potluck, congregants need only arrive a bit early to set up and then take care of cleanup, as well as make sure we have what we need for the dinner. To host an oneg, congregants provide the desserts, challah, and other necessities and also need to arrive a little early on the evening of the service to set up and then deal with cleanup. Carol Zar, who coordinates these activities, can answer all questions. Please see if you have a spot in your schedule, as these are important ways to really help the congregation.

There will also be opportunities at the picnic to sign up for High Holy Days aliyot, a way to directly participate in our ritual and worship. We will also seek those who wish to serve at the food pantry and to provide or co-provide a dinner at Hope Haven. This is a vital service that we do for those in need in the greater DeKalb/Sycamore community.

I also have the pleasure of announcing that on Friday, August 30, we will have the first meeting of our Religious School, at 5 PM in the synagogue. This will take place prior to our Shabbat service, at 7:30 PM, which will be followed by an oneg.

In this *haShofar*, you will read of our plans for the High Holy Days, which we will again hold in the synagogue on Russell Road, but this year under the guidance and leadership of Rabbi Julie Adler. We also have plans for Adult Education events, our Book Group, our Religious School, and a full year of worship, fellowship, community action, and the celebration of Jewish life in DeKalb/ Sycamore. I urge you to read and consider how you wish to participate, and whether there are others in our wider community whom we can reach out to with these opportunities.

In addition to our plans for fulfilling our joys, duties, and obligations as a congregation, we also need to be aware of the changing world we live in—both changes within our own congregation and changes in the wider community and world in which we live. I invite you to join with me and the board of Congregation Beth Shalom as we consider such issues as whether our building meets our needs as a congregation and how we should respond to the political and social issues that confront us as part of our nation and as Jews within a worldwide Jewish community.

From the Rabbi

We find ourselves on the cusp of a new Jewish year, our first High Holiday season together. And it's the end of the summer. Though it might be appealing to remain in vacation-mode—to continue traveling, spending time with loved ones, and rejuvenating our bodies and minds—the coming of the new year implores us to wake up!

There is a tradition of blowing the shofar every morning during the month leading up to Rosh Hashanah, the Hebrew month of Elul. And though we may prefer to stay in a sleeplike state, especially after a frustrating year politically, socially, and emotionally, the Jewish year asks us to rise up from our respite and declare: "*Hineni*" — "Here I am."

Hineni. This Hebrew word implies being absolutely present and ready to listen and to respond. It appears only a few times in the Torah—yet Abraham uses this powerful word no fewer than three times just in the story of the Akedah, the Binding of Isaac. The Binding of Isaac is one of the most well-known texts of the High Holiday liturgy. Classical commentators, such as Maimonides, argue that these verses with the refrain "Hineni" demonstrate Abraham's willingness to respond to the will of God and sacrifice his beloved son Isaac. Though the word is repeated, each utterance of "Hineni" is somewhat different and may be interpreted differently. When God calls out to Abraham asking him to sacrifice Isaac, God calls out only once and Abraham answers, "Hineni." When Isaac asks his father for an explanation of his ordeal, he asks only once and Abraham replies, "Hineni." But the angel of God, who cries out to Abraham to stop him from slaughtering Isaac, must cry his name twice—"Abraham, Abraham!"—before the patriarch responds, "Hineni." Here I am!

Jewish tradition holds that no word in the Torah is ever wasted. So why did the angel need to repeat Abraham's name? Imagine what it took for Abraham to force himself to sharpen a knife, bind his beloved son on the altar, lift that knife above his son's throat. Once he got to that point, what would it cost him to stop and consider that perhaps this entire nightmare had not been God's will after all? The angel needed to call out twice just to get Abraham's attention because Abraham was so caught up in the zeal of the moment.

Abraham's greatness was not his willingness to listen to God's command to painfully bind and terrorize his son or his capacity to murder. Sadly, there are many people who are ready and willing to commit atrocities. Abraham became the ancestor of our people because of his ability to hear the angel's voice in the midst of his fanaticism, to allow for doubt even at the very last moment.

Like Abraham, we live in a time of violence and fear, when drastic measures might appear to be necessary. We read the story of the Binding of Isaac every year on Rosh Hashanah as we focus on teshuvah, transforming our lives and our world. Every year we must pause to recall that the knife can be halted even in mid-air.

Abraham lifted up his eyes and *saw* that there was another option—a ram caught in the thicket that he could sacrifice to God instead of Isaac. We learn from Abraham that we must continually open our eyes and expand our internal and external vision to search for a better way.

We must question the voice of any authority, even God, when it asks us to sacrifice a single human life.

As we prepare ourselves for the High Holiday season marking the beginning of the Hebrew year 5780, we pray that we might be brave like our ancestor Abraham: May we be ready to listen, to be fully present, and willing to change course—even at the last minute—if necessary.

Special Holiday Rituals: Kever Emet and Tashlich

Congregation Beth Shalom will observe two special rituals around Rosh Hashanah. On Sunday, September 29, from 1 to 2 PM, we will gather at the Garden of Shalom at Fairview Cemetery for Kever Emet, a memorial service commonly observed before the High Holy Days.

After Rosh Hashanah services on Monday, September 30, we will observe tashlich, casting our transgressions, symbolized by bread crumbs, into the Kishwaukee River. We will be meeting at Annie's Woods, near Lucinda Avenue just north of the NIU music building, at 3 PM.

Yizkor: Call for Names

During the Yizkor service on Yom Kippur, we remember those dear to us who have passed away. Names are kept from previous years. If you sent names in previous years that were read, you do not need to send them again.

Religious School



This year Religious School will be held on Friday afternoons before a scheduled Shabbat service or potluck, unless otherwise noted on the schedule below. On those Friday nights when a service follows at 7:30 PM, we invite students to bring a picnic dinner for the hour between the ending of Religious School and the start of services. Subscribe to Our e-Calendar

To do this, start your electronic calendar program, then locate the option to "Subscribe" to an online calendar. Copy the entire webcal URL information above and paste it into the URL field in the subscribe form of your e-calendar program.

The new CBS events can all appear under a separate header in your e-calendar titled "Congregation Beth Shalom." Having all CBS events in their own header makes them easy to work with. You can choose to turn off (or back on) displaying of CBS calendar events entirely. You can also delete one (or more) of the calendared events so they are permanently removed from your calendar (although they will still be on everyone else's calendar). You can delete all events associated with this calendar by just deleting the "Congregation Beth Shalom" e-calendar header. And you can unsubscribe from the e-calendar at any time ending all future updates.
